In traveling back to Rayville, I am sure that your minds wondered back on your classmates, teachers, and the many events that took place in the old school and in this very building, which is the only physical structure left as a reminder of where God has brought us from. From playing basketball on a dirt court when the weather permitted, God not only moved the basketball team indoors, but He also made it possible for us to have plays, socials, junior/senior proms, and our baccalaureate and commencement exercises in this old reminder of a very important part of our history.

Speaking of past history, my mind goes back to the Fall of 1942 when a friend and next door neighbor brought me from Bucks Quarters (what was sometimes referred to as "the mud hole") to be enrolled in Rayville Rosenwald Elementary and High School as a first grader. Needless to say, I was one scared child that day.

It was during that time that I became acquainted with a young principal, Mrs. Eula D. Britton, who became a part of my life (and I am sure many of yours) with her strong influence. The History Of

Rayville Rosenwald/Eula D. Britton High School

On August 16, 1904, a group of black citizens formed "The Rayville Industrial and Agricultural School" corporation. The men responsible for the formation of this corporation had availed themselves of the provisions of the general statutes of the State of Louisiana and acts amendatory and especially Act No. 50 of the General Assembly of 1890, relative to organization of corporations for literary, scientific, and charitable purposes and acts amendatory. As a result, the Charter of "The Rayville Industrial and Agricultural School," was published.

The title and corporate name of this institution was designed for a period of ninety-nine

years from and after the date assigned to the document.

The object of the institute was:

The education and moral training of colored children male and female, and the dissemination of knowledge in practical agriculture mechanics, other industrial arts and sciences, together with a thorough academic, literary and business education: including domestic science, fancy, practical, and general needle and laundry work and such other useful industries as may from time to time be suggested by experience, or promote the general object and welfare of this institution and prepare its pupils for the indispensable industries of the age and guide, under proper restrictions the head, the hand, and the heart of the colored race.

The corporation was governed by a president and general manager and a Board of Trustees consisting of fifteen members. The first officers and members of this corporation were: President and General Manager, Reverend R. Amos; President of the Trustee Board, Reverend F. Turner; Vice President, N. W. Draper; Secretary, A. L. B. Strother; and Treasurer, N.W. Woodson. Members were: W. C. Cooper, J.B. Winchester, Reverend J.L. Elbert, Leroy Coleman, G.H. Washington, Tom Dunnick, W. M. Bodger, John Draper, Gus Kenton, Lee Stephenson, and Alex Tignor.

As a direct result of the 1904 Rayville Industrial and Agricultural School Corporation, the Rayville Rosenwald, Rayville Colored High and finally Eula D. Britton High School had its beginning. The first school was known as "The College." Professor Amos was the president, and the instructors were Professor and Mrs. Tombs, Miss Elliot (Delhi, LA), Professor J. Anthony (Rayville), and Professor P. J. Sims (Lincoln Parish). The students attending the

college were enrolled in cooking, sewing, music, math, and English courses.

The College was dissolved because of financial difficulties, and the next school for the

children of the black community was held in Macedonia Baptist Church.

In October of 1916, the first school session was held with Professor Edward W. Beasley, Sr., of Houma, Louisiana as the new principal. Some years later, Professor Jackson became the principal with Mrs. Clara Bell Coleman serving as the assistant and Mrs. Jackson as the third member of the faculty. The third principal serving during this time was Mrs. Ollie Hill of New Orleans, with Mrs. Eula D. Britton, Mrs. O.S. Hill, and Mrs. Evan as members of the faculty.


During the latter part of 1924, land was purchased from Mr. William Tolliver Cook, and grades 1-6 were transferred from the Macedonia Baptist Church to the new school building, present site of the recreational area. Mrs. Britton was named the principal, and the first graduates from the 7th grade held their graduation exercises at the Macedonia Baptist Church. Members of the class were: Mrs. Mary Jenkins Kennedy (valedictorian), Mrs. Jessie Williams Gundy (salutatorian), Mrs. Geneva Cross, Mrs. Alberta Hawkins, and Mrs. Alberta Osborne. The second 7th grade class of graduates (1925) held their exercises at the First Baptist Church.

In 1933, the second school was approved as a junior high school, and in 1939 the first senior high school was approved and given a "B" rating, with eleven young men and women receiving high school diplomas. In 1940 the school was accredited and given the "AA" rating which was the highest rating given to Negro high schools in the state of Louisiana. During this time, the teaching staff increased, and more room was added.

Rayville Rosenwald grew from a one-room, one teacher, and a five month school term to twenty-four rooms, twenty-six teachers, and a nine month school term with an enrollment of one thousand thirty. Other specific improvements were a full-time librarian, equipped lunchroom with seven lunchroom workers, a well-equipped home economics building, a modern gymnasium, and a fast developing agriculture department. Future plans include a new pant with the following: twenty-six classrooms (fully-equipped), commercial department, music department, teachers lounge (2), clinics, sewing department with fitting rooms, a cooking department and science department.

Since Rayville Rosenwald High School has been accredited, it has turned out three hundred and eleven graduates. A considerable number of them entered such schools of higher education as Grambling State University, Leland College, Florida A&M University, University of Illinois, and others. It boasts of business men and women, college professors, military soldiers, ministers, and other professionals.

Through the years the growth of the school from the "College" to Eula D. Britton High School (1954) was phenomenal. The original concept in 1904 until dissolution in 1970 was based on the need to provide educational opportunities for black citizens of Rayville. During the 63 years of actual school existence, unlimited efforts were made to ensure the perpetuation of this idea, implanted in the minds of the early pioneers of the Rayville black community.



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"It's not what we gain... but what we give that measures the worth of the life that we live."







Born in Farmerville (Union Parish), Freddy was the third child and only son of Fred and Telitha Brown Rivers. After a year, his mother relocated back to Rayville where he now resides.

Freddy is married to the former Sylvia Rabun of Bastrop, and they have a daughter – Zaire Cleopatra. He also has another daughter from a previous relationship.

Freddy is an alumnus of Britton, graduating in 1970 as class salutatorian. He was the Freshman Class president and a member of the band, student council, and honor society.

After graduating from high school, he entered Louisiana Tech University to major in premedicine. After changing his major several times, he graduated in 1974 with a Bachelors of Arts degree in Political Science with the purpose of going to law school. After canceling his law school plans, he re-entered Tech to pursue an education degree. He graduated in 1976 with a Bachelors Degree in Social Studies Education. In 1984, Freddy received his Masters Degree in English Education. In 1988, the Masters+30 ranking was added to his teaching certificate, and in 1994, he received his certification credentials in Library Science.

Freddy taught English, Business English, and Spanish I at Rayville High School; Junior High English at Morehouse Junior High School; and GED English and science at Horace G. White Learning Center in Winnsboro, LA. After teaching for 33+ years, he retired spending his time doing custom woodworking.

In the spring of 1990, Freddy crossed the burning sands to become a member of **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity**, **Inc.** in the Monroe Alumni Chapter. In the spring of 1996 during the Southwestern Province Council meeting, Freddy became a charter life member of the Southwestern Province. In December of the same year, he became a charter member of the Rayville Alumni Chapter.

Since joining the Rayville Rosenwald/Eula D. Britton Alumni Association, he has served faithfully, being selected as a board member and assuming the secretarial duties after the untimely death of the previous secretary.

Freddy is a member of the Rankin Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church where he has served in numerous positions, including Steward, Trustee, choir director, and Sunday School teacher.


